Play & Learn at Home

Encourage different types of play with objects you can find at home or in nature. Below are three activities you can try at home related to the same type of play.

Hold the child and show them an open box with a picture of desert animals taped inside. Point, name a picture and make the animal sound. Set out two boxes with pictures of desert animals taped inside. Encourage the child to point at a picture. Name the animal and encourage them to mimic the animal sound.

Set out three boxes, each with a picture of a dessert animal inside. Encourage the child to name an animal and make its sound.

READ EVERY DAY

Establish a reading routine

to bond with your child through stories. Reading to your baby can help establish a predictable daily routine while also promoting brain activity, early literacy skills and language development.

Try this way to read: Play with sounds: Find at least one word, sound or sound effect on each page to repeat multiple times. Encourage the child to repeat the sounds or words while you read.

How:

- Make sound effects for each animal as you read. Encourage the child to join in and mimic the sounds!
- Highlight the rhyming words in the story and have fun emphasizing them.
- Make sound effects for the characters as you read aloud.
